## New Book from the Center

# SIGNIFICANT IMAGES OF RAILROADING



From the collections of the Center for Railroad Photography & Art

*Significant Images of Railroading* is a new book from the Center, showcasing its photography holdings. Those include the collection of Wallace W. Abbey, whose circa 1950 view portraying two Milwaukee Road *Hiawatha* passenger trains in Chicago Union Station adorns the cover. The 8½ in. x 11 in., 78-page, softcover publication will be available for sale at the Saturday reception in the Glen Rowan House for \$20.

Debuting at Conversations 2015 is a new publication from the Center, *Significant Images of Railroading*. Edited by executive director Scott Lothes, the 8½ in. x 11 in., 78-page, softcover book presents, for the first time, a summary of the Center's holdings, which have grown to number close to 200,000 photographs. They come from ten major sources, and a biographical sketch at the beginning of each section gives an overview of each photographer. The sketches follow in the spirit of the exceptionally well-received sketches created for our *Railroaders* catalog and exhibition at the Chicago History Museum.

*Significant Images* reflects ongoing developments in the Center's programs and growth. Foremost the contents demonstrate the value of proper archival organization of the photographs in our collections. Part of that work occurs at our headquarters in Madison and is spearheaded by our now resident archivist, Jordan Radke. Volunteers including Aviva Gellman, Nona Hill, Jeff Mast, Mike Valentine, and especially John Kelly also deserve no small measure of thanks. Our archival partner, Lake Forest College, houses and processes collections in the Archives & Special Collections of its Donnelley and Lee Library. Be sure to meet their archivist, Anne Thomason, and our two graduate interns, Jim Cascino and Andy Meyer, at this year's conference.

We are proud of the way *Significant Images* looks—in great measure due to Phil Hamilton, our longtime graphics advisor and friend. Its snappy cover, careful use of spot varnishing of photographs, and amazing quadtone reproductions have come about through experience gained over the nearly twenty years of the Center's existence. Design credit is also due to board member Jeff Brouws, whose expertise led to several small but significant changes.

Finally, we thank the donors whose gifts made this publication possible: Fred and Dale Springer, the *Trains* magazine preservation award, the Candelaria Fund, and Bon and Holly French. Their generosity made this possible—the first volume in what we hope will be a series showcasing the Center's increasingly important collections of railroad photography and art.

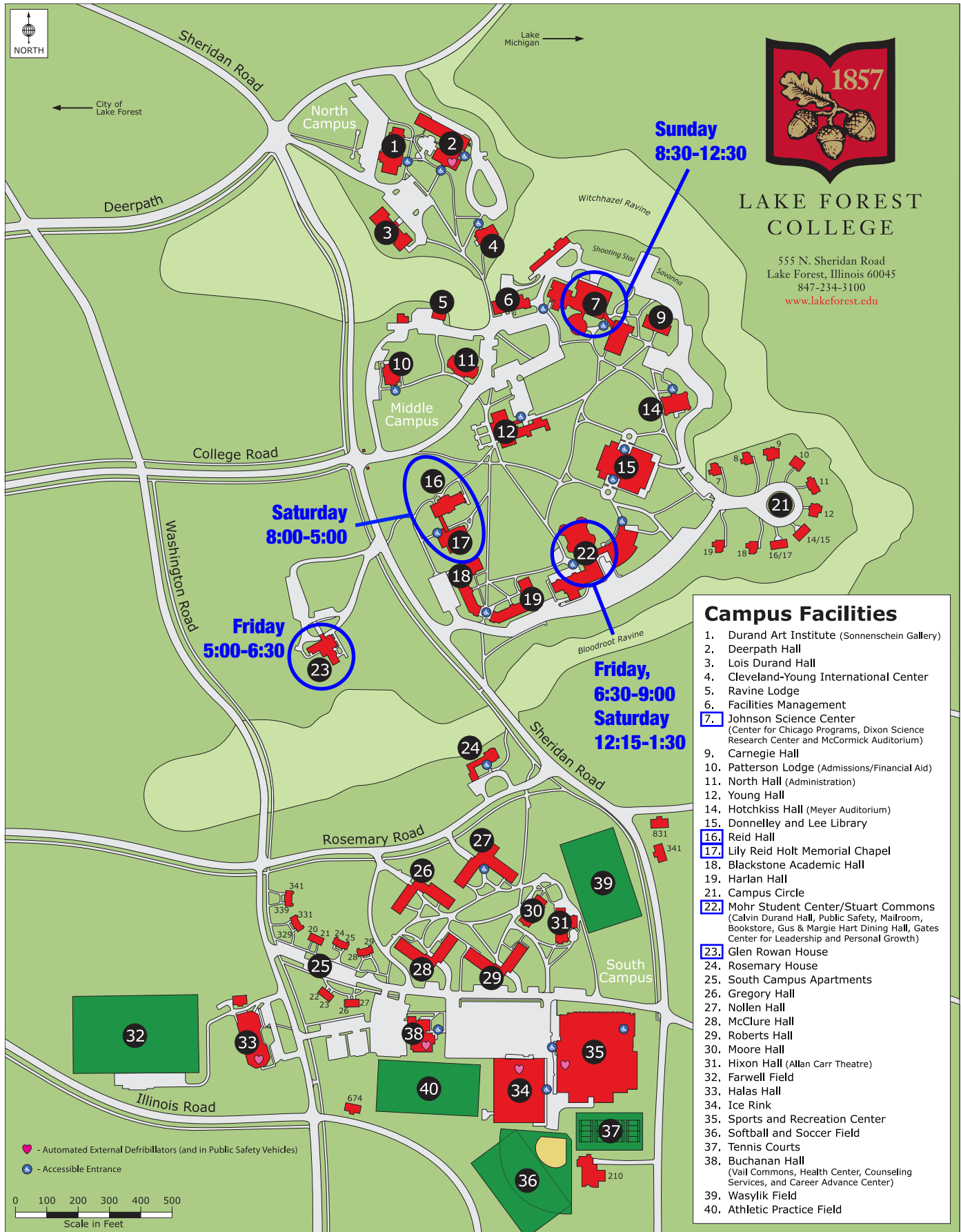

# Presenters



**Diane Bacha, Milwaukee, Wisconsin**

*Great American Railroad Stories*, Saturday, 9:30 A.M.

Bacha, publisher of *Trains* and *Classic Trains* magazines, grew up in New Jersey and worked for more than twenty-five years as an editor and media executive for newspapers in New York and Wisconsin. She has an English degree from the University of Delaware, is a 2003 USC Annenberg/Getty Arts Journalism Fellow, and serves as a founding board member of the Society for Features Journalism Foundation.



**Ed Bartholomew, York, United Kingdom**

*British Railway Photography*, Saturday, 3:15 P.M.

Bartholomew is the Senior Curator of Image & Sound Collections at Britain's National Railway Museum, where he has worked for the past nineteen years. He is particularly interested in the representation of railways in art, photography, and graphic design. His publications have included, with Michael Blakemore, *Railways in Focus*, a history of British railway photography based on the museum's collections.



**Ted Benson, Modesto, California**

*72-82: Western Pacific's Final Decade*, Saturday, 4:00 P.M.

Benson has enjoyed a lifelong fascination with railroading. Born in Los Angeles in 1948 and raised in Modesto, California, where he continues to reside, he retired in 2009 following a forty-year career as news photographer for *The Modesto Bee*. Benson has authored (or coauthored) eight books, and his many honors include two prestigious Railway & Locomotive Historical Society awards for writing and photography.



**Dick Dorn, Yuba City, California**

*72-82: Western Pacific's Final Decade*, Saturday, 4:00 P.M.

Dorn was born in Berkeley, California, and grew up in the Bay Area. He moved to Yuba City in 1971 where he began a thirty-five-year teaching career. He has been photographing railroads for more than fifty years, coauthored *Diesels Over Donner* with Dick Steinheimer, and has written nearly forty magazine articles. He is a collector of railroad signal equipment and has constructed a full-scale depot on his property.



**Justin Franz, Whitefish, Montana, [www.justinfranz.com](http://www.justinfranz.com)**

*Shooting for the story: Approaching railroad photography with a journalistic eye*, Sunday, 9:45 A.M.

Franz is a writer and photographer based in Whitefish, Montana. Born and raised in Augusta, Maine, he grew up railfanning with his father, Tim Franz, and recorded the rapidly changing rail scene in northern New England in the 1990s and early 2000s. After graduating from the University of Montana in 2011 with a print journalism degree, he was hired by a weekly newspaper, the *Flathead Beacon*, in Kalispell.



**David Kahler, Pittsboro, North Carolina**

*The Railroad: The Art of Place*, Saturday, 11:30 A.M.

Prior to his thirty-six-year career as an architect in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, Kahler spent his childhood watching steam freight trains in Pennsylvania. From 1992 to 1997, he journeyed to West Virginia six times to photograph the last vestiges of the Norfolk and Western Railroad with the intended purpose of capturing the art of place. Kahler has served as Vice-President of the Center since its incorporation in 1997.



**J. Parker Lamb, Austin, Texas**

*Postwar Transformation: 1950-1970*, Sunday, 9:00 A.M.

Lamb retired in 2001 after a distinguished tenure in the engineering faculty at the University of Texas in Austin. His hundreds of published images display a talent that is at once journalistic and artistic, as seen in *Steel Wheels Rolling*, a portfolio of his work, and his several other books. In 1991 he received the Fred A. and Jane R. Stindt Photography Award of the Railway & Locomotive Historical Society.



**Jeff Mast, Canton, Michigan, [www.jeffmastphotography.smugmug.com](http://www.jeffmastphotography.smugmug.com)**

*Journey into Photo Charters*, Saturday, 8:45 A.M.

Born in Detroit, Michigan, in 1956, Mast has spent his career working in municipal civil engineering in Royal Oak, Michigan. Photography started with railroads and a 4-H club project at age eight, and it blossomed to include Great Lakes “Lakeboats” and airplanes. He has authored a number of articles in *Trains* magazine, and his photography has appeared in numerous railroad magazines and books.



**Peter Mosse, New York, New York**

*The World of Railroad Paintings: 175 Years, 25 Countries*, Saturday, 10:45 A.M.

Mosse was born in 1947 and grew up in England where he witnessed the final years of regular steam. He has since photographed steam operations in more than fifty countries. He received an MA from Oxford and an MBA from Penn’s Wharton School, and he worked for the Rothschild banking group in London and Malaysia before moving to New York City in 1977. He purchased his first railroad painting in 1980.



**Dale Sanders, Ferndale, Washington**

*72-82: Western Pacific’s Final Decade*, Saturday, 4:00 P.M.

Sanders was born in Oroville, California, in 1957 and earned a bachelor’s degree in visual communication from California State University, Chico. He has worked as a professional photographer, graphic designer, production artist, and pre-press quality controller. He is the past editor of *CTC Board: Railroads Illustrated*, and he has authored or coauthored five books of railroad photography, with many more in the works.



**Dave Stanley, Stockton, California**

*72-82: Western Pacific’s Final Decade*, Saturday, 4:00 P.M.

Stanley, born in 1953, grew up next to the Central California Traction Company tracks in Sacramento, California, where he developed a lifelong interest that led to a career in railroading. Currently a locomotive engineer for Union Pacific, he has worked under four corporate flags during the past forty years. He has coauthored two other railroad books, and he created the Winterail photography exposition in 1978.



**William Benning Stewart, Indianapolis, Indiana**

*Up and Down the Monon, Everything is Fine*, Sunday, 11:00 A.M.

An Indiana native and veteran corporate communications executive, Stewart has been a lifelong student of transportation history. He is the author of twenty-five articles on the topic in national magazines including *Trains* and *Classic Trains*. He spent fifteen years at the Chrysler Corporation in Auburn Hills, Michigan, and from 2005 to 2008 he was curator of the company’s Walter P. Chrysler Museum.



**James Swensen, Ph.D., Salt Lake City, Utah**

*Always on the Go: FSA Photography, Russell Lee, and the Railroad*, Sunday, 11:45 A.M.

Swensen is an assistant professor of art history and the history of photography at Brigham Young University. His research interests include the art and photography of the great American surveys of the nineteenth and twentieth centuries. He has recently completed two books on photography: *Picturing Migrants: New Deal Photography and The Grapes of Wrath* and an investigation of Dorothea Lange and Ansel Adams.



**Michael R. Valentine, Ferndale, Michigan**

*Journey into Photo Charters*, Saturday, 8:45 A.M.

Valentine is Manager, Training Product Group, Leoni Engineering Products & Services, Inc. He previously worked for the BNSF Railway, and he has lived and studied at the University of Innsbruck, Austria. He is an avid photographer in the U.S. and abroad, with more than two hundred photographs published in *Trains* and other periodicals and books in the U.S. and Europe.



**Axel Zwingenberger, Ahrensburg, Germany**

*Boogie-woogie music and its railroad influences*, Friday, 8:00 P.M.; *The Magic of Trains*, Saturday, 2:00 P.M.

Zwingenberger, born in 1955 in Hamburg, Germany, is a blues and boogie-woogie pianist, and songwriter. He received eleven years of conventional piano training and is one of the finest boogie-woogie musicians in the world. He is also a talented and creative photographer, beginning at age ten with German steam locomotives. Inspired by O. Winston Link, he has been making night action photographs since the 1990s.

# Print Program

The Center is debuting two new, limited edition prints at Conversations 2015: Ted Benson's 1982 photograph of the Tidewater Southern in Modesto, California (opposite page), and Jeff Mast's 2012 photograph of a Cumbres & Toltec photo freight on Cumbres Pass in New Mexico (above). Benson's is a silver gelatin print on 11×14 paper. Mast's is a 10×15 archival pigment print on 13×19 paper. Each one is available in an edition of ten, signed on the back in pencil by the artist. They will be sold at the conference for the one-time price of \$225 each; any prints still available will be offered for sale through the Center's website, [www.railphoto-art.org](http://www.railphoto-art.org), at the regular price of \$250 plus shipping.

## About the Print Program

Begun in 2009, the Center's print program offers opportunities to collect important railroad photographs at affordable prices, while providing financial support for the Center's ongoing programs. As with other art-based nonprofits that sell prints from well-known photographers, the Center prices its photographs well below the gallery rates of San Francisco, New York, and Chicago. The selection and prices give incentives to collectors to purchase artwork they like while helping an organization they believe in.

To put the Center's offer in context, consider that fine-art photography prints from major artists now range from \$2,000 to \$3,000 (Richard Stein-

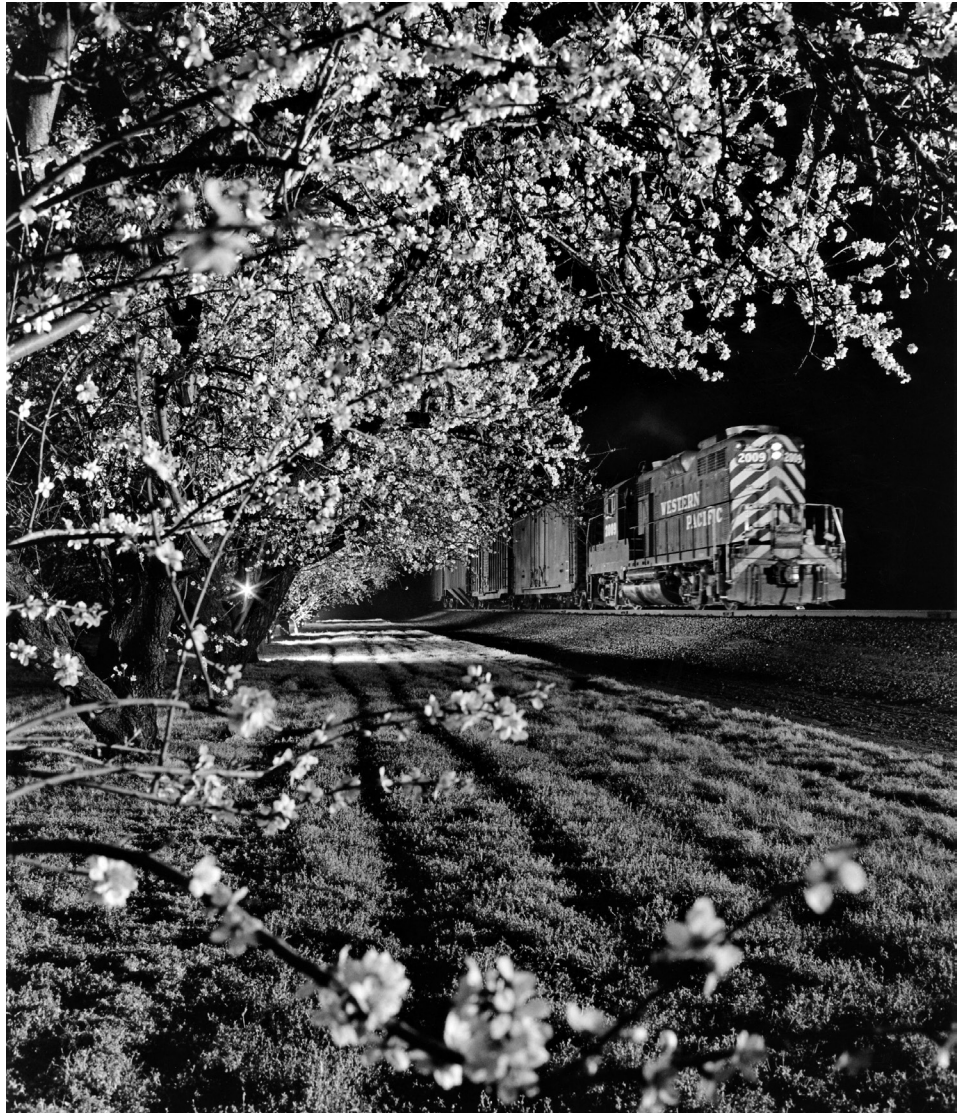
heimer prints, for example), \$3,000 to \$7,500 (David Plowden), and up to half-a-million dollars for artists such as Andreas Gursky. Photographs by Mel Patrick, Howard Pincus, Wayne Depperman, John Gruber, and Richard Steinheimer (again) that appeared in the *Starlight on the Rails* show at the Robert Mann Gallery in 2000 brought \$750 to \$1,500 each. Plowden prints once sold for \$125; the asking price today regularly exceeds \$3,000.

Collecting photography is fun and rewarding. Foremost, it brings aesthetic pleasure; secondarily, it can prove a better investment than many stocks. You can see the prints themselves on display at this year's conference, and they will be available until the editions sell out. We will continue to unveil new selections in the same price range each year, featuring them also on the website. If you have suggestions for future participating photographers, please let us know.

In addition to the two images from this year's print program, you may peruse and purchase past works from previous years.

# Print Raffles and Book Sales

As in recent years at the conference, two photographers have donated prints that the Center has framed and matted for raffles.

J. Parker Lamb's photograph (opposite) shows Illinois Central 4-8-2 steam locomotive no. 2613 next to the icicle-covered water tank in Cairo, Illinois, waiting for the *Creole* passenger train before heading north back to Carbondale in January 1959. The 16×20 archival pigment print was made by print program coordinator Jeff Brouws and is matted and framed in black metal to 24×30 inches.

In addition to Lamb, renowned photographer David Plowden has again donated a photograph for the raffle. His archival inkjet print is 11×14 inches, matted, and framed in black metal to 20×24 inches.

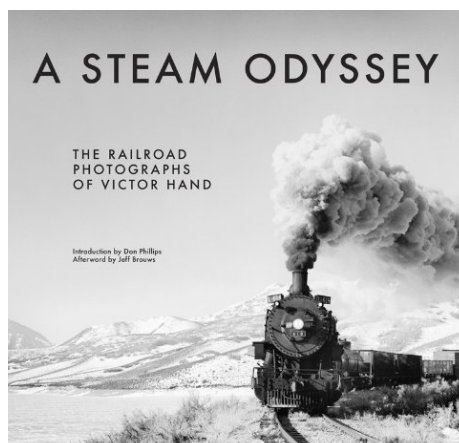
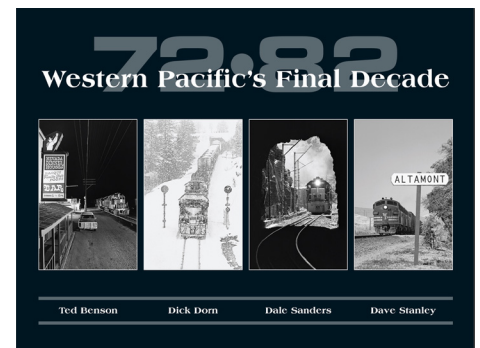
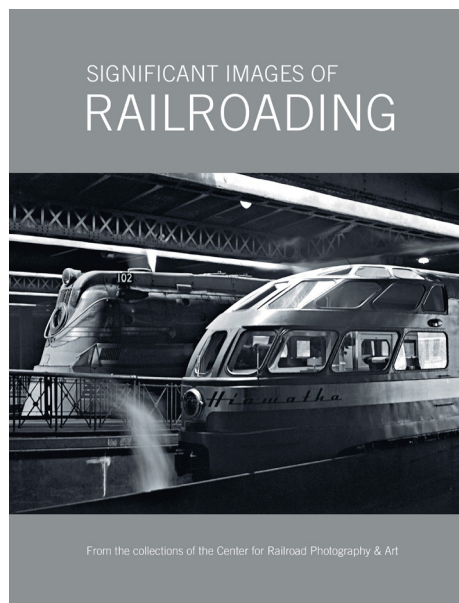
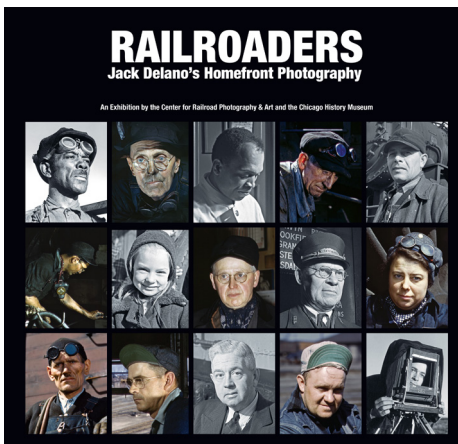
The drawing for Plowden's print will be held at dinner on Friday; Lamb's will be drawn on Saturday.

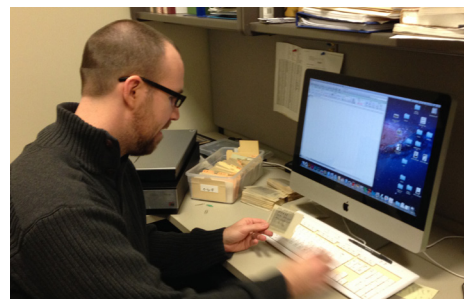

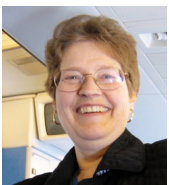

# About the Center for Railroad Photography & Art

Founded in 1997, the Center for Railroad Photography & Art is a national non-profit arts and educational organization based in Madison, Wisconsin. As its mission the Center “preserves and presents significant images of railroading, interpreting them in publications, exhibitions, and on the Internet.”

The Center conducts its programs in-house and throughout the country, with the aid of numerous partners. Foremost is its recent collaboration with the Chicago History Museum on the major exhibition, *Railroaders: Jack Delano's Homefront Photography*, and an accompanying 200-page catalog prepared by the Center. They tell the stories of forty-nine Chicagoland railroad workers during World War II and serve as a prime example of the kind of work that can be created from a significant, well-preserved collection of rail photography. As museum president Gary Johnson said, “Museums with photographic archives, take heed!”

The Center also prepares traveling exhibitions about railroad workers and individual photographers such as David Plowden and O. Winston Link. Venues have included Grand Central Terminal, the California State Railroad Museum, and Milwaukee's Grohmann Museum. Support from the North American Railway Foundation (NARF) led to the long-running “Representations of Railroad Work” program. All told, the Center has brought some twenty unique exhibitions of significant railroad photography and art to sixty venues throughout the country.

Efforts to preserve railroad photography and artwork have led to the Center's amassing some 200,000 images, principally the ten collections featured in its recent publication, *Significant Images of Railroading*. The Center conducts many of its preservation activities in concert with the Archives & Special Collections

of the Donnelley and Lee Library at Lake Forest College.

Publication of the Center's journal, *Railroad Heritage*, occurs quarterly. Each issue features work by historic and contemporary photographers and artists plus news of developments in the field. With NARF's help, special issues have honored workers, women in railroading, and individual photographers, and have concisely explained railroad history and preservation.

Each spring going back to 2003, the Center hosts this conference, and all but one have been held on the campus of Lake Forest College. The conference provides a forum for veteran and young photographers alike—as well as artists, historians, editors, and railroaders—to mingle both socially and formally, present and discuss their work, and address photographic and artistic issues. Thanks to the generosity of several conference patrons, the Center recently began offering scholarships to enable young or developing photographers and artists to attend the conference.

The annual John E. Gruber Creative Photography Awards Program recognizes recent work by railroad photographers in the United States and abroad. Named for the Center's principal founder, the awards program includes an exhibition at the California State Railroad Museum and publication in *Railfan & Railroad* magazine.

Internet sites [www.railphoto-art.org](http://www.railphoto-art.org) and [www.railroadheritage.org](http://www.railroadheritage.org) expound on the Center's activities and provide an online image archive with detailed descriptions. The Center maintains many additional online resources at Facebook, Flickr, Twitter, LinkedIn, Amazon, Youtube, RailPictures.net, and at Trainsmag.com. Follow them to stay abreast of current events and trends in railroad photography and art as well as the Center's research and acquisitions.



The Center's biggest project is *Railroaders: Jack Delano's Homefront Photography*, a collaborative exhibition with the Chicago History Museum that opened in April 2014. Among its 190,000 visitors in its first year were Gary Sinise, the famous actor, whose grandfather was an Indiana Harbor Belt conductor who is featured extensively. *Railroaders* will be on display at the museum through August 2016.




